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from the head of school



Each year, since I joined the school in 1986, I have been proud of our evolution. This year, on the occasion of our 25th anniversary, I took a few steps back and looked at the whole journey. I was truly amazed.

Carol Proctor Landsberg charged us all with a strong vision for the school. As an educator of the deaf, she knew that all children need to be challenged in

order to achieve their potential. She had taught young deaf and hard of hearing children, prepared them for academic success, only to watch as they entered mainstream school settings that left them behind, both academically and socially. She founded Echo Horizon School on the principle that all students would benefit if deaf and hard of hearing children were truly integrated into a "normal" learning environment with hearing peers.

Our program achieved early success, quickly surpassing the "normal" standard for the learning experience. The single most important element in our formula has been our extremely proficient faculty. Their individual expertise, grounded by our educational philosophy that encourages and celebrates difference, is at the root of each of our successes.

Throughout our history, we have been committed to the integration of technology within our program. In the 1980s, our students used Apple IIe computers before computers were a staple in schools across the nation. Those gave way, not only to newer technology, but technology that provided teachers and students new functionality. Today, we are adding electronic whiteboards that allow teachers to integrate audiovisual elements into their lessons. Students interact with these boards and save their work, allowing them to extend the lesson far beyond the classroom.

This past year, we were designated a SMART Showcase School by SMART Technologies. As a demonstration school, we use prototype technology on our classrooms and welcome fellow educators from across our region to see how it works in daily use.

Our students have been recognized consistently for their use of technology in the classroom. Once again, a number of our students were recognized for exemplary work by the Computer Users in Education (CUE) Student Media Awards in the Spring. Our students are creating blogs, podcasts and multimedia presentations with a facility that boggles their parents.

In the spring, we hosted a delegation of the Singapore Ministry of Education as they prepared to write their national Master Plan for technology use in their country's schools. I watched our confident students respond to our visitors' questions, teaching them about something they knew well. It was again clear to me it's not the technology that matters--it's what we do with it. Our students go out into the world knowing how to relate to technological innovation, not just technology.

I could not be more proud of our students, our faculty and staff and our families. Because we are used to the high level of accomplishment and success of our graduates, it's important to take stock of what we have become. Thank you to all of you who hold Echo Horizon School's mission and programs close to your hearts. Your investment in our success is paying dividends—and we could not do it without you!

from the board of trustees





The past year has been one of successful transition for both our community and Board. As we celebrated our 25th anniversary, it was striking how much our school community has grown through the years. Under the steady leadership of our Head of School, Paula Dashiell and the Director of our Echo Center, Vicki Ishida, our continued commitment to best educational practices has allowed the school to consistently provide a wonderfully rich environment in which our students grow and develop.

Over the past five or so years, we have successfully implemented the initiatives that flowed from our last Strategic Planning process—including the significant re-envisioning and renovation of our facility and a greater focus on diversity and inclusivity. At the end

of 2007, the Board of Trustees initiated a new process to develop a long-range plan for the next five years. The Strategic Planning Committee, ably co-chaired by Trustees Richard Hull and Nora Wendel, has been hard at work taking a fresh look at Echo Horizon School and the Echo Center. It has been thrilling to see our community come together to share ideas, thoughts, desires and dreams for our continued success. In the coming months, our new Strategic Plan will be unveiled. Thank you to all of you who supported this process with your time, talent and responsiveness.

Our AIM study in 2006-2007 resulted in a report that is guiding our diversity initiatives. This past year, we worked in depth with an educational consultant who, following these recommendations, helped us to enrich our curriculum and to design a new element of our applicant outreach, focused on increasing geographic and socio-economic diversity. We implemented a series of neighborhood coffees that have brought school administrators and current EHS families together with prospective families who want to learn more about us.

In Fund Development, we saw a significant increase in support of Annual Giving. We concentrated the campaign into the month of October. John Crabtree-Ireland, our Director of Operations, helped to guide our community and focus our efforts to help us

create an enriched giving environment without noticeable change to the culture of our community.

Once our renovation concluded, the Capital Campaign morphed into the Building Fund. Families new to the school continue to pledge significant gifts toward our goal of \$3.2 million, matching the commitment of those families who gave before them, knowing that future classes would reap the direct benefits.

This year's Spring Auction broke all previous income records and proved to be an apt setting to celebrate our quarter century. Our parent volunteers are the reason why this event has grown to such a superlative extent.

Over the years, our school has been recognized for being on the forefront of elementary education. We have attracted a lot of attention and visitors from all across the world. Whether traveling from afar to visit or just walking your children onto campus for class, it takes only a few moments to see something extraordinary—innovative teaching styles, interaction between students rooted in our Points of Pride, exceptional integration of technology and the arts throughout the curriculum, and a life-changing program for our deaf and hard of hearing students—the magic of this place is made everyday by our superb faculty and staff.

from the echo center director



The 2007-2008 school year marked the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Echo Center. We've come a long way in these 25 years and we continue to realize the vision of Carol Proctor Landsberg. Since our founding in 1983, Echo Center has stood out in the field of deaf education in the United States. We continue to provide one of the finest auditory oral options for deaf and hard of hearing children in a

mainstream setting. Our unique collaboration with Echo Horizon School enables us to fully integrate our students in a unique way compared to other oral education programs

We continue to be recognized as one of the finest mainstream deaf and hard of hearing education programs in the nation. In 2008, Echo Center/Echo Horizon School was given the *Continuing Excellence* award at the 48th Biennial Convention of the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. This award recognizes programs that continue to demonstrate on-going commitment to best practices in technology, teaching and auditory oral/verbal intervention. Echo Center received special recognition in 1991 and this award celebrates our continued achievement.

Our program garners worldwide recognition, as well. We continue to attract visitors from other auditory/oral teaching programs throughout the world. We host visiting professionals in many fields and we receive many visitation requests throughout the year. Another way of communicating within the field is through our Echo Center teachers presenting auditory/oral techniques and ideas to their peers. We are fortunate to work together with Elaine Wrenn and the Technology Center to apply current technology to language and auditory skills.

For the past eleven years, we have provided additional speech and language services to our students beyond the school day to further support and improve their skills. Our staff is highly motivated, as well. This past academic year, two Echo Center teachers sat for the AG Bell Academy for Listening and Spoken Language Academy certification exam. We are proud that Shea Denham and Carly Alsbach are now certified as LSLS Certified AVEds. This certification recognizes their skills to provide a high level of service to families wishing to utilize listening and spoken language for their children.

In the year of our Silver Anniversary, Echo Center is proud to build upon its high standards and expectations. The collaboration and hard work of our teachers, staff, students, parents and supporters allows us to achieve our founder's vision, one student at a time.



financial report 2007-2008



Fundraising success and prudent control of expenses resulted in another financially healthy year for Echo Horizon School in 2007-2008.

Through parent efforts and the Annual Giving campaign, the school raised over \$630,000 this year. We are fortunate to have such a committed family of parents and friends.

Enrollment was close to full capacity, financial aid was increased and our employee compensation continued to grow, helping us to recruit and retain excellent faculty and staff. We were able to closely monitor expenses and keep our overhead low.

As of June 30, 2008, the Building Fund/Capital Campaign had raised approximately \$1,960,000 toward our \$3.2 million goal. We will be raising the difference to retire this internal debt over the next several years.

Your ongoing support will help us maintain the school's fiscal well-being. For your past and future support, we are very grateful.





"Technology is integrated across the curriculum at Echo Horizon School. Students, classroom teachers and specialists have access to a wide range of hardware and software solutions. They use them to facilitate learning and communication in powerful ways."

On any given day, students are choosing from a variety of technology tools to learn and communicate their ideas. They are presenting and discussing their findings through interactive slide presentations on electronic whiteboards in the classroom. They are taking scientific measurements with digital probes that easily interface with their computers and then sharing their results with students and professionals around the world via blogs and videoconferencing. Many record audio and video, digitally editing and sharing their learning in podcasts and videos. EHS students use technology in ways that prepare them for success in the 21st Century.

We decided to co-chair this year's Annual Giving campaign because we feel that Echo Horizon School reinforces the values that we try to practice in our home with our son Matthew and daughter Caroline. We have seen through their growth that, in

Our goal is to send our students out into the world knowing what they **can** do, not what they **cannot** do."

Teamwork and sportsmanship are key skills in elementary school. We present incremental challenges and opportunities to participate, teaching to the individual child while building a cohesive group. Competitiveness can inhibit participation, so we emphasize self-improvement, cooperation and participation instead of "winning." We reinforce our Points of Pride within group activities and it has immediate results. Students can participate in a series of intramurals—a mix of competitive and noncompetitive activities during noon recess, including Mileage Club, basketball, soccer and flag football.
